No notes to explain her act were left by Mrs. Gronemeyer, but her sister said that she had frequently threatened to end her life because of despondency over her husband's death.

Farming and civic work occupied the life of Helms who would have been 72 years old on Feb. 2, 1940. A member of the county board of assessors from 1930 to 1936, Helms had held numerous public positions.

A leader in farming circles, Helms was perhaps best known for his work in the Turkey Hill Grange of which he was a member for 57 years, being a Gold Star member. He had held every office in the grange. Helms took part in everything the grange did, until recent years, even playing with the baseball team.

For many years Helms was president of Smithton township school board. During the World War he was one of the Four Minute Men organization and regarded that patriotic duty as an honor never to be forgotten. Helms was long a director of the Belleville Savings Bank.

In politics Helms was a life long and staunch Democrat. At the time of his death he was a state quarantine inspector of cattle, having been appointed to that position in 1933.

The fourth man working in the room where the fall occurred was Dave Bloomer, of East St. Louis, who escaped the brunt of the fall and was not injured.

Without warning, the 12 inch top of the room crashed as the four men were loading a car. Hagen was but a few feet from Warning. While buried in the coal, he called, "Are you all right Henry?" Warning did not answer as he was apparently already dead. Hagen pulled himself from underneath the fall, spraining his knee doing it.

Milkert had also been buried by the fall. Both he and Hagen today were expressing amazement that they had not been killed or more seriously hurt. Help was brought by Bloomer who was at the edge of the fall.
